

In Greek mythology, Pegasus was the winged horse offspring of the sea foam of Poseidon and the blood of Medusa, who was slain by Perseus. Through the ages, Pegasus has symbolized imagination, inspiration, intellect, knowledge, science, understanding, and wisdom.

In 1974, Dean Miller chose the image of Pegasus as the symbol of the College.

The past year has found the Mississippi State University College of Veterinary Medicine undergoing a struggle to ensure its continued existence. In January 1986, the Board of Trustees of the Institutions of Higher Learning proposed that several state-supported schools be closed, among these the College of Veterinary Medicine. As a result of the proposal, tremendous energy was expended in an effort to gain recognition for the College's previous, as well as ongoing, contributions to the state. The school was also forced into a process of intense self-examination. During the period of doubt, one person never lost sight of our reason for being: Dean Billy C. Ward. Always ready to "think positive," Dean Ward served as an inspiration for many when the possibility of closure seemed so real.

In January 1987, Dean Ward left the College to assume responsibilities as Vice President of Administration in the office of MSU President Donald Zacharias. Although no longer directly associated with the College of Veterinary Medicine, his ideas and positive mind-set continue to be felt by all. It is to him that this Pegasus is dedicated.

A native Texan, Dr. Ward was born in the city of Phillips in 1941. He graduated from Texas A&M University with a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree in 1964 and then studied for a Ph.D. in Comparative Pathology at the University of California at He served as Davis. Commissioned Officer (Lt. Cmmdr.) in the U.S. Public Health Service from 1967-1968 where he was Chief of the Pathology Section in the Bureau of Radiological Health. He held a faculty position at Oklahoma State University from 1969-1973, later moving to Washington State University. While in Washington, he was



Acting Director for the Washington State Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory and served the U.S. Army Veterinary Corps Liason. He achieved Diplomate status in the American College of Veterinary Pathologists in 1969; only one year later, he attained the same status in the American College of Laboratory Animal Medicine.

Dr. Ward came to Mississippi State University in 1977 with the rank of Professor. Always closely associated with academic innovation. he has at

one time served as a Chairman of each phase of the curriculum. In addition to his scientific publications, he has authored numerous articles and given countless presentations regarding alternative teaching modalities for veterinary students. As a result, the College of Veterinary Medicine at MSU is nationally recognized as a pioneer in the field of veterinary education.

Dr. Ward, we wish only the best for you and appreciate what you gave us: your best.




