Tax on Naval Stores, Wines, &c., and Agricultural Products,

The production of any year preceding 1863, to be returned on 1st day of July, 1863, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and payable 1st day of October; including also, moneys, bank notes or other currency, on hand or on deposit on 1st day of July, 1863, and the amount and value of all credits on which the interest has not been paid, held or owned by any person, co-partnership or corporation, on said 1st day of July, 1863, either at home or abroad.

I, *J. M. Bagland* of the County of *Sanborn* and State of *Miss* do swear, that the above list contains a true statement of all the naval stores, salt, wine, spirituous liquors, manufactured and unmanufactured tobacco, cotton, wool, flour, sugar, molasses, syrup, rice and other agricultural products, not necessary for family consumption for the unexpired portion of the year 1863; and of all moneys, bank notes, or other currency on hand or on deposit, at home or beyond the limits of the Confederate States, including all gold and silver coin, and the amount and true value of all credits on which the interest has not been paid, and not employed in a business the income of which is taxed under the provisions of the following act, held or owned by me either in my own right, or in the right of any other person, corporation or firm, in accordance with the provisions of the act, "to lay taxes for the common defence, and carry on the government of the Confederate States."
