### TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

WHEREAS: Governor Fielding L. Wright of Mississippi has heretofore publicly announced his position that the State of Mississippi go on record as opposing the legislative movement sponsored by the National Democratic Party in the National Congress wherein anti-southern legislation is sought to be enacted into law, which said proposed legislation, if enacted into law, will improperly usurp the functions of the state government and will in effect destroy southern traditions and southern civilization; and

WHEREAS: It is the consensus of opinion of the Board of Directors of the Mississippi Junior Chamber of Commerce that the position as announced by Governor Wright is well taken and said position should have the endorsement of this body and the entire citizenship of the State of Mississippi, now THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Mississippi State Junior Chamber of Commerce at its regular quarterly meeting assembled in Jackson, Mississippi does hereby unanimously go on record as endorsing the program as announced by Governor Wright and does hereby pledge to him our wholehearted cooperation in realizing and attaining the accomplishments and objectives outlined by him and does hereby re-affirm our confidence in our southern traditions and southern civilization;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this meeting and copies hereof be furnished to Harry S. Truman, President of the United States, the Chairman of the National Democratic Party, to Governor Fielding L. Wright and to each member of the Mississippi Delegation of the National Congress. ✓
