Dear Ma,

We are now at Graz
in Styria, on our return
from the Chateau of
Prinzen and Prince von
Lichtenstein, where I
received Bud's letter in
which he kindly en-
closed the check of
\$250.00 from Son - I can

only thank you very
much as Bud tells
me most decidedly
not to think of returning
it to you, but, though
I am so grateful for
the continued thought
of me, I must tell you
how truly distressed
I am that you will
keep on sending me
so much. I must beg
of you not to do so and

Remind you again that for the
present I have more than you, and
really cannot bear to have you do so
much for me. You could have
now especially, found so much use
for this money moving into a new
house with so much to arrange and
buy, it is really distressing to me to
know that you have sent so much.

I am really so very anxious to hear
something about your house, how it
is furnished and papered etc.
and now I have destroyed Dad's
letter in which he sent you exact
address, so that I must send this
to his home and hope you will
have the number of your house
sent to me again. I think you will
really enjoy house-keeping again, as

You know ^{5th} I think it
the only way to live, but
you will write so little
of how and what you
are doing - You must
by this time, consider
me very conceited &
egotistical, as I write all
about myself, down to
the smallest unim-
portant details - I think
it must be also, very
 tiresome to you to read
my letters, as I have

a miserable hand-
writing at best and
do so much in the way
of writing notes and
letters to outsiders that
when I begin a letter
to you and his I become
very careless in the
writing knowing only
the desire to say all
I wish without an idea
of how disgusted you
must really be with
the writing. I must
