ANNOUNCEMENT

The first Mississippi Gulf Coast Club Boys' Camp was held at the Gulf Coast Military Academy July 8, 9, 10, 11, 1924. Seven counties, George, Jackson, Harrison, Hancock, Pearl River, Marion and Simpson were represented and 178 boys attended. A fine program of education, recreation, and inspiration was carried out. The boys had a wonderful time; everybody was unanimous and enthusiastic in their demand for another camp this year.

The camp will be enlarged this year, not only by including Club Boys from Walthall County, in addition to all of the counties represented last year, but a joint Boys' and Girls' Camp will be held this year. Joint camps have been so successful that we anticipate that this will be the best camp ever held in the State.

TIME

Camp will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, July 7, 8, 9, 10. The first meal at camp will be supper Tuesday, July 7th.

PLACE

The camp will be held at the Gulf Coast Military Academy six miles east of Gulfport on the beach road. The Gulf Coast Military Academy is an ideal place for summer camps; the soft sunshine, the balmy breezes and the placid waters of the Gulf Coast provide a climate and an atmosphere unsurpassed anywhere in the world. The barracks are screened, electric lighted, and equipped with steel spring cots and shower baths. Well balanced and wholesome meals are served in the big dining halls. Spacious play grounds, athletic fields, and salt water bathing provide ample opportunity for play and recreation.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the 4-H Camp is to teach boys and girls the 4-H standard, to inspire them to lift themselves toward these standards and to discover and train them for leadership.

ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

The camp will be composed of bona fide Club Boys from George, Jackson, Harrison, Hancock, Pearl River, Marion, Simpson, and Walthall counties and bona fide Club Girls from Jackson, Harrison, Hancock, Pearl River, Marion, Walthall, Jones and Forrest counties.

The boys will be under the personal supervision of H. L. Hopper, J. H. Price, Henry Leggett, S. F. O'Neal, W. B. Tate, R. M. Coman, A. D. Stewart, and E. E. Johnson, county agents respectively of the above named counties, and F. J. Hurst, District Club Agent, and J. E. Ruff, District Agent.

The girls will be under the personal supervision of the following county home demonstration agents: Mrs. Iola Havens, Mrs. Pearl Polk Burson, Miss Mayme O'Dom, Mrs. Nellie Hopkins, Miss E. V. Brown, Miss Minnie Prescott, Miss Eva Leggett, Mrs. May Cooper Carpenter, and Miss Elaine Massey, Girls' Club Agent, and Mrs. Della Blanche Alley, District Agent.

In order to insure system, promote order and discipline in the camp, the boys and girls will be organized into companies and under the general supervision of county and home demonstration agents, so that parents need have no fear about the safety of their boys and girls.

The only rule will be: A Time for Everything and Everybody on Time.

MEALS AND LODGING

The boys and girls will room in separate dormitories and get their meals in the main dining hall of the Gulf Coast Military Academy.
