Dear Jim:

Pat McCarran said that he wanted to go on and bring out the Anti-lynch Bill that the subcommittee had already passed out and get it on the Calendar in order to stop the agitation regarding the drastic anti-lynch bill. He said he would be glad to hold it up during your absence and for you not to worry about the matter, and that he would hold it over until one week from next Monday, at which time he hopes you will be here and have ready any opposition which you might wish to interpose. He will want the bill voted on without fail one week from next Monday.

I have not yet had a chance to see Dick Russell about the matter but with McCarran's assurances, I think it is all fully covered.

I hope you are having a good trip to Mississippi.
