Dear 1

Let me express my deep thanks for your letter, and I want to assure you that I share your concern about the invasion of our state by racial agitators and zealots.

As the current reign of terror in New York shows, there is plenty these people could do in their own back yards, and I think we will all be better off when they pack up and leave.

I have been doing everything possible to get them out of our state. As you perhaps know, I called on the President, the Attorney General, the Governors of their home states, my fellow Senators and the parents of some of these people, to use their influence to get them back home. I hope they will be leaving soon, and regret very much that they came at all. Their real purpose, of course, was to stir up trouble and violence and try to get troops sent to Mississippi.

I think our people have shown remarkable patience and restraint in putting up with these ordeals. I think you will be interested to reading some statements I made on the subject in recent weeks, and enclose copies herewith.
